As you stand below its mist-shrouded peaks, you'll feel the buzzing mystery of this ancient citadel come to life.

Next, explore fascinating archaeological sites like the mysterious circular terraces of Moray and the stunning salt pools of Maras, where mining traditions have endured for centuries. Whitewater raft down the Urubamba River, cutting through canyon landscapes amid lush strawberry fields.

Step deeper into Peruvian culture with a visit to Chinchero, where skilled artisans share the ancient art of Andean textile weaving. Your exploration culminates in the lively streets of Cusco, the historic heart of the Incan Empire. Wander through bustling markets, marvel at towering hillside fortresses, and discover temples that still glow with ancient energy.

Cusco, Peru (CUZ)*

*CUZ refers to Alejandro Velasco Astete International Airport. If flying from the US, you will likely connect in Jorge Chávez International Airport in Lima, Peru (LIM). You may need to book tickets for each flight separately.

For each trip, plan to arrive into CUZ by 11 am on day 1, and depart CUZ after 2 pm on day 7.

Day 4	Tour the Machu Picchu citadel
Day 5	Explore Maras Salt Mines, Moray, and Chinchero
Day 6	Tour Cusco, including the San Pedro Market and Sacsayhuaman
Day 7	Tour the Temple of the Sun and Museo de Arte Precolombino, then depart from Cusco (CUZ)

MACHU PICCHU 2025 » day one



DAY ONEArrive in Cusco, head to Ollantaytambo

After arriving in lively Cusco—once the epicenter of the mighty Incan empire—we'll journey straight into the Sacred Valley, bound for Ollantaytambo, a village known as the "Living Inca City" where ancient stone streets and original Incan architecture still remain.

This ancient stronghold was the site of one of the Incans' last victorious battles against the Spanish conquistadors, and its remarkable terraced fortress still looms over the village.

Our day will be filled with exploration—wandering through towering ruins, touring local museums and markets, and immersing ourselves in Peruvian traditions. As you become acclimated to the high elevation of the Andes, soak in awe-inspiring views of Mt. Verónica, known as the "Protector of the Sacred Valley," rising majestically at 19,226 feet. Indulge in authentic Peruvian cuisine and begin your deep dive into the rich culture and spirit of this extraordinary land.


DAY TWOTour ruins, raft the Urubamba

After touring another awe-inspiring Incan site, we'll get suited up for the legendary Urubamba River. Known to the Incas as Willkamayu, or the "Sacred River" in Quechua, these waters were believed to mirror the Milky Way, flowing through the heart of the empire as a divine connection between the heavens and earth.

As you navigate class I–III rapids, you'll pass through remote villages, lush strawberry fields, and ruins that stand as silent guardians of Incan history. Keep an eye out for flashes of color soaring overhead—this region is a birdwatcher's paradise, home to more than 400 species, including the giant hummingbird, vibrant mountain tanagers, and the iconic Andean condor.

Head ashore for a scenic lunch beneath the towering presence of Huacay Huilcay—aka Mt. Verónica—for a unique culinary tradition: Pachamanca, meaning "earth oven." This ancient feast involves marinating meats and vegetables with native spices and baking them underground on hot stones—an offering of gratitude to Pachamama, the Earth Mother.

DAY THREEHike the Inca Trail to Machu Picchu

The morning opens with a scenic train ride weaving through the Sacred Valley, where snow-dusted peaks gradually give way to the lush cloud rainforest. Step off the train and onto the legendary Inca Trail, a path carved by the Incans in the 15th century. The trek covers approximately 6.5 miles, climbing nearly 2,500 feet—a challenging but rewarding ascent where you'll certainly feel the spirit of these huge mountains.

We'll stop for lunch at Wiñay Wayna—meaning "Forever Young" in Quechua—cascading terraces and meticulously crafted stonework harmoniously blended into the steep mountainside. Keep an eye out for wild orchids—hundreds (possibly up to a thousand) of species bloom along this stretch of rainforest.

The trail continues upward toward Inti Punku, the Sun Gate, once the ceremonial entrance to Machu Picchu for Incan pilgrims. As you step through the stone gate, you'll catch your first glimpse of the ancient citadel—its iconic stone structures emerging from the bright green hillsides, surrounded by its neighbors Putucusi and Huayna Picchu and deep blue skies.

DAY FOUR Tour the citadel of Machu Picchu

Today, relax in the wonders of Machu Picchu, one of the world's greatest archaeological wonders. Built in the mid-15th century during the reign of Pachacuti Inca Yupanqui, a powerful and influential ruler, the citadel is believed to have served as a royal estate, a religious sanctuary, or perhaps both—though its exact purpose remains shrouded in mystery!

At its height, the Inca Empire was the largest empire in pre-Columbian America, stretching from modern-day Colombia to Chile. Yet Machu Picchu remained hidden from the outside world for centuries, spared from Spanish conquest—likely due to its remote and nearly inaccessible location, perched nearly 8,000 feet above sea level atop a narrow mountain ridge.

The site itself is a masterpiece of engineering and architecture. Constructed without the use of mortar, its precisely cut stones fit together so seamlessly that not even a blade of grass could slip between them. This sophisticated technique, known as ashlar masonry, allowed the structures to withstand centuries of earthquakes and weathering. The city was designed with deep respect for the surrounding landscape, aligning with astronomical events and integrating natural features into its layout.

Machu Picchu is divided into urban and agricultural sectors, with terraced fields to prevent erosion and maximize arable land. The citadel houses more than 150 structures, including temples, plazas, and homes, each built with purposeful design. The Temple of the Sun and the Intihuatana Stone—a ritual stone believed to have been used as a solar clock—are among the most sacred sites, reflecting the Incas' deep spiritual connection to nature and the cosmos. Freeroaming llamas and alpacas graze peacefully against a backdrop of panoramic views.

For centuries after the fall of the Inca Empire, Machu Picchu remained hidden beneath dense jungle overgrowth, known only to local Quechua communities. It wasn't until 1911 that American historian and explorer Hiram Bingham brought global attention to the site, though it had never truly been "lost" to the indigenous people living nearby.

Today, Machu Picchu stands as a UNESCO World Heritage Site and one of the New Seven Wonders of the World, drawing visitors from around the globe. Beyond its beauty, it serves as a powerful reminder of the Inca civilization's enduring legacy.

DAY FIVETour Maras salt mines & Moray

No visit to the Sacred Valley is complete without experiencing the Maras salt mines. These shimmering terraced pools cover the mountainside to form a stunning mosaic. But they aren't just beautiful—they are living history. Dating back to pre-Incan times, each pool taps into a subterranean saltwater spring. When the Inca empire rose to power, they expanded and organized the salt production system, turning it into a vital resource for preserving food and fueling trade routes across the Andes. For more than 500 years, local families have worked these pools by hand, passing down their techniques through generations to harvest Peru's prized pink salt—a perfect keepsake for culinary enthusiasts.

Next, we'll explore the enigmatic ruins of Moray, one of the empire's most fascinating examples of agricultural innovation. At first glance, the site resembles a sunken amphitheater carved into the earth, but these concentric terraces likely served as a sophisticated open-air agricultural laboratory. The Incas used these circular depressions to create microclimates—each level varying slightly in temperature and conditions—allowing them to experiment with different crops and growing techniques. Some historians believe Moray played a vital role in domesticating staple crops like maize and potatoes, helping feed the entire empire.

Our adventure continues in Chinchero, often referred to as the birthplace of the rainbow in Incan legend. Chinchero is renowned for its master weavers, who preserve ancient Andean techniques for producing textiles. You'll get to witness a captivating demonstration of natural dyeing, where artisans extract vibrant hues from native plants, roots, and insects to color hand-spun alpaca wool, from deep indigos to rich crimsons. You'll also have the opportunity to purchase incredibly soft souvenirs directly from these artisans.

DAY SIX Explore Cusco City

On our final full day in Peru, we'll dive into Cusco's local markets, where centuries-old traditions thrive amidst colorful stalls. Browse bustling alleyways filled with fresh spices, handcrafted textiles, and intricate Andean jewelry.

The afternoon continues with a visit to some of Cusco's most significant sites, beginning with Sacsayhuamán. Perched on a hill overlooking Cusco, these stone walls once played a vital role in protecting the Incan capital from invading forces. Constructed about 600 years ago during the reign of Pachacuti, the same ruler who commissioned Machu Picchu, Sacsayhuamán is renowned for its colossal limestone boulders, some weighing over 125 tons. Like Machu Picchu's construction, these boulders were precisely fitted without mortar. The fortress's design mirrors the head of a puma, an animal sacred to the Incas that symbolizes strength and protection. Even after centuries of earthquakes and human intervention, many of its massive walls remain intact, standing as a powerful reminder of the empire's resilience.

Next, we'll explore the mysterious site of Q'enco—also known as Q'inqu or Kenko, meaning "labyrinth" in Quechua. Carved into a sprawling limestone outcrop, the site features maze-like channels and ceremonial altars believed to have been used for ritual sacrifices—possibly involving chicha (fermented corn beer) or other offerings to honor Pachamama and other deities. At the heart of Q'enco lies an intricately chiseled ceremonial stone, where high priests may have conducted rituals under the alignment of the sun, moon, and stars.

A farewell celebratory dinner will be a fitting conclusion to this unforgettable journey through Peru's rich tapestry of history, culture, and beauty.


DAY SEVEN Temple of the Sun and depart Cusco

This morning, we'll visit one of the most sacred sites of the Incan Empire: Coricancha, or the Temple of the Sun. This temple was dedicated to Inti, the Incan sun god, and served as the most important religious site in Cusco. In its prime, Coricancha was adorned with walls covered in solid gold sheets, and its inner sanctuaries housed golden statues and offerings meant to honor the gods and reinforce the emperor's divine connection to the sun. The temple's advanced engineering reflected the Incas' deep astronomical knowledge, with structures aligned perfectly to mark solstices and seasonal changes. Though much of the original temple was dismantled by the Spanish and repurposed into the Santo Domingo Convent, its impressive stone foundations remain, surrounded by beautiful flower gardens.

Depending on flight times, we can also tour an Andean art museum, which offers a glimpse into Peru's artistic traditions, showcasing pre-Columbian artifacts, textiles, and colonial-era masterpieces.

As the sun sets over Cusco's terracotta rooftops, we'll bid farewell to the magical world of Peru.

BEFORE YOU GO

BOOKING PROCESS & FORMS

- \$1,000 deposit accompanies each registration
 - Registration includes a completed questionnaire by each participant/couple traveling together
- Payment is due in full March 1, 2025
 - For all registrations after March 1, full payment due within 5 business days

FLIGHTS, TRAVEL DOCUMENTS, & IMMUNIZATIONS

- There are no direct flights from the US into CUZ; you will most likely connect in Lima, and it's common to arrive into LIM at night. There is a hotel attached to the airport for overnight stays.
- On day 1, we request that you arrive into Cusco (CUZ) by 11 am.
- On day 7, we recommend booking a flight that departs out of CUZ after 2 pm.
- Please make sure your passport is valid for **at least** six months past your travel dates; Peruvian customs and immigration officials are very strict about this rule!
 - Your passport is also required to hike the Inca Trail.
 - US citizens are not required to obtain a visa before traveling to Peru.
 - For all other citizenships, please check your country's requirements for traveling to Peru.
- Though not required, we advise checking the Centers for Disease Control for recommended vaccines.
 - Please note we will **not** be in yellow fever territory.

PERUVIAN CURRENCY

- The official currency in Peru is the Nuevo Sol (S/.). Coins come in 5, 10, 20, and 50 cents, as well as 1, 2, and 5 Soles. Paper bills come in 10, 20, 50, 100, and 200 Soles.
 - We recommend exchanging currency prior to your arrival in Peru.
 - Visa, Mastercard, and American Express are widely accepted in bigger cities.

PRO TIPS

- It's not safe to drink the tap water in Peru. Guides will provide drinking water, and purified bottled water is widely available. Close your mouth when showering, and brush your teeth with bottled water as well.
- Due to sensitive plumbing, it is a common practice to throw away toilet paper (rather than flushing it). Restrooms are generally equipped with proper trash receptacles.
- Public restrooms can be primitive; we recommend carrying toilet paper and hand sanitizer if using one.

STAYING HEALTHY IN PERU

- High elevations
 - This trip spends time at high altitudes. Everyone responds differently to being at high elevation; some people choose to bring elevation sickness medication just in case.
- Traveler's diarrhea
 - Some people also choose to bring antibiotics in the event of traveler's diarrhea.
- Travel insurance
 - We highly recommend purchasing emergency travel and medical insurance.

FITNESS LEVEL

- You'll find varied, rugged terrain on the Inca Trail, which includes rocky steps, uphill climbs, and narrow trails. Between the trailhead and Machu Picchu, there is no vehicle support.
- We know fitness looks different for everyone. We recommend hiking, jogging, biking, or getting involved in some other cardiovascular exercise in the months and weeks leading up to your trip.

Weather & elevation

In June and July, daytime highs are typically around 66°F, with nighttime lows dipping into the 30s. We'll likely have sunny skies at higher elevations, and it will get a little more humid on the Inca Trail toward Machu Picchu.

Due to the elevation, we advise bringing electrolytes and staying well hydrated, starting a few days before the trip and throughout your time in Peru.
